When the cardinals of the Catholic Church next gather in the Sistine Chapel to elect a pope, Allen argues, they will in effect be deciding whether to continue the policies Ratzinger has been the central force in shaping. Work of Love-Leonard J. DeLorenzo 2017-02-02 The saints are good company. They are the heroes of the faith who blazed new and creative paths to holiness; they are the witnesses whose testimonies echo throughout the ages in the memory of the Church. Most Christians, and particularly Catholics, are likely to have their own favorite saints, those who inspire and “speak” to believers as they pray and struggle through the challenges of their own lives. Leonard DeLorenzo’s book addresses the idea of the communion of saints, rather than individual saints, with the conviction that what makes the saints holy and what forms them into a communion is one and the same. Work of Love investigates the issue of communication within the communio sanctorum and the fullness of Christian hope in the face of the meaning—or meaninglessness—of death. In an effort to revitalize a theological topic that for much of Catholic history has been an indelible part of the Catholic imaginary, DeLorenzo invokes the ideas of not only many theological figures (Rahner, Ratzinger, Balthasar, and de Lubac, among others) but also historians, philosophers (notably Heidegger and Nietzsche), and literary figures (Rilke and Dante) to create a rich tableau. By working across several disciplines, DeLorenzo argues for a vigorous renewal in the Christian imagination of the theological concept of the communion of saints. He concludes that the embodied witness of the saints themselves, as well as the liturgical and devotional movements of the Church at prayer, testifies to the central importance of the communion of saints as the eschatological hope and fulfillment of the promises of Christ.

The Metaphysics of the Resurrection-Terrence Patrick Ehrman 2012 This study investigates the relationship between eschatology and anthropology through a philosophical and theological analysis of the doctrine of bodily resurrection. Catholic theology over the last four decades has seen a widespread replacement of the traditional eschatological model of death - intermediate state - resurrection on the Last Day, with its associated Thomistic body-soul anthropological model, by a resurrection in death eschatology with its associated phenomenological anthropology which eliminates the aporia associated with the "anima separata" and in which an experiential but not physical body is raised. The eschatological model invoked has diverging implications for anthropology and specifically for an understanding of embodiedness. Both contemporary theologians and analytic philosophers concern themselves with the question about what kind of anthropology is needed to express the coherence of bodily resurrection. This study first investigates the debates in eschatology, ranging through the 1970's and 1980's, in which Joseph Ratzinger defended a traditional eschatology against Gisbert Greshake's resurrection in death. Ratzinger criticized Greshake's eschatology as being counter to revelation and its associated anthropology as dematerializing the resurrection by severing any connection between the earthly and risen body. Because neither Greshake nor Ratzinger developed a robust anthropology to support their respective views of embodiedness and bodily resurrection, this work turns to analytic philosophy to fill this void. After a discussion of various anthropologies ranging from biblical to ancient and modern Christian and secular, the anthropologies of two contemporary Christian analytic philosophers, representatives from two ends of the dualism-materialism spectrum, are discussed and analyzed in relation to resurrection. The compositional dualism of Richard Swinburne and the constitutional materialism of Kevin Corcoran, however, are both insufficient to account for the unity of the human person. David Braine fills the space between dualism and materialism with an anthropology which understands human beings as psychophysical wholes, linguistic animals who think in a medium of words. Braine draws upon an Aristotelian-Thomistic notion of soul and insights from Wittgenstein about language use to demonstrate human transcendence beyond bodily death. Braine's anthropology allows a recovery of Thomistic thought and provides a metaphysical foundation to defend a physical, bodily resurrection of the numerically identical person.

The Bible and Catholic Ressourcement: Essays on Scripture and Theology-William M. Wright IV 2019-09-12 The essays in this collection all concern the interpretation of Scripture in relation to the Catholic Ressourcement. A theological renewal movement that began in the early twentieth century, the Ressourcement movement centered on a “return to the sources” such as Scripture, the Church Fathers, and liturgy. The point of such a return was to discover in these sources the wisdom, truth, and spiritual insight which could speak meaningfully to contemporary challenges. William M. Wright first focuses on three major Ressourcement figures—Henri de Lubac, Yves Congar, and Joseph Ratzinger—and considers aspects of their theological thinking about Scripture or how Scripture is employed as a theological resource. Next, Wright examines Benedict XVI’s Jesus of Nazareth books, showing how they put into practice (for a general readership) many of the theological insights characteristic of the Ressourcement movement. Last, Wright considers how the theological insights of the Ressourcement movement can be used to as a resource for the interpretation of Scripture. He uses characteristic Ressourcement concerns, such as the relationship between the testaments, the theology of history, and liturgy, to help illumine the biblical text.
