Chronicle of the Third Crusade-Helen J Nicholson 2019-07-15 Published in 1997, this is a translation of the Itnerarium Peregrinorum et Gesta Regis Ricardi, 'The Itinerary of the Pilgrims and the deeds of King Richard,' based on the edition produced in 1864 by William Stubbs as volume 1 of his chronicles and memorials of the reign of King Richard I.
