Nothing is more universal, more common and more shared in American history and sociology than the fact that most of our ancestors, black and white, were enslaved, bond-indentures and slaves who were dominated and super-exploited by few overlords. Colonial America was the preferred dumping ground for British, outcasts, rejects, criminals, masterless class, vagabonds, bond-indentures, slaves, etc., until 1776 when Australia replaced America as the British dump for its rejects and surplus citizens. Thus, that America was a nation founded by British rejects and losers is inherently more rational than the prevailing orthodoxy or the Obama theory of Americas founders that they were great honorable men who journeyed across the ocean for freedom because of the obvious reason that good, powerful achieving citizens do not normally emigrate to new uncharted lands.

Mabena 1990 South Africa is a country in which inequality and discrimination on the basis of race, gender and class is built into the constitution. My aim in this research study is to trace South African women's participation in the political struggle waged from both inside and outside the borders of South Africa for national liberation. It included a field work investigation of ANC activists in exile in Tanzania. The study attempts to investigate which factors mobilised and continue to organise South Africans and in particular women out of private family responsibilities and into the streets, and for some finally into exile, to challenge the white minority government. South African black women did not find themselves discriminated against only by the colonial government. Pre-colonial Afican attitudes towards women especially in the field of politics were discriminatory as well and continue to be practised by the majority of men, thus driving black women into waging a multi-dimensional struggle. Their secondary status in society and marginalised position in politics is also experienced within the 'democratic' anti-apartheid movements including the African National Congress. My study of the ANC settlement in Tanzania provides evidence for this hypothesis.
