Hanson 1987-04-13 Katherine Mansfield was a formidable critic: astute, witty and something more - she had, as Middleton Murry put it, an extraordinary style and critical verve, mastery and 'sureness of touch'. This is the first scholarly edition of her critical writings. A substantial introduction sets the scene for an understanding of Katherine Mansfield's position as a woman writer on the edge of, but never completely accepted by, Bloomsbury; responding to the pressures of the First World War, illness and exile, and attempting to reconcile the facts of life with the truths of fiction. Careful annotation supplies essential information for following the evolution of her ideas - and her art - from 1907 until her death in 1923.

Her book reviews were collected - and subjectively edited - in a small volume edited by J. Middleton Murry in 1930 and subsequently re-edited by Clare Hanson, together with some essays, in The Critical Writings of Katherine Mansfield in 1987. Both are incomplete and now long out of print. Vincent O'Sullivan's excellent selection of her Poems in 1988, nevertheless omitted many pieces, and 25 years on, in the light of new scholarship on Mansfield's life, the poems demand a new edition. In addition, many of Mansfield's translations from the Russian are almost unknown and were never previously collected. The volume also contains material never seen before, including several new poems, a new and complete creative 'impression' from 1911, a newly collected and transcribed translation of Stanislaw Wyspianski's play The Judges, and never-before published translations of Chekhov, Tolstoy and Dostoevsky. This volume of Mansfield's poetry and critical writing comprises: Book reviews (not collected since 1987 and incomplete); Poetry (not collected since 1988 and incomplete); Translations (not previously collected); Essays (not collected since 1987 and incomplete); Parodies (not previously collected); and, Pastiches (not previously collected). Much of the material has been out of print for decades. It is fully annotated. Some of the material has never been collected or seen before.

Volumes 1 and 2 - the fiction - bring together 220 stories and story fragments, expanding considerably on a previous 'definitive' edition of 85 stories. The material presented here has been minutely edited for the first time, with precise historical, cultural and biographical contextualisations. Essential contextual perspectives reveal Mansfield's evolution as a writer, and the impact of her era on early drafts of her mature writings. A detailed index facilitates cross-reading and referencing for scholars and general readers alike. Together, all four volumes offer readers the scholarly edition Mansfield's writing so richly deserves.

The Critical Response to Katherine Mansfield-Jan Pilditch 1996 Documents the critical reception of Mansfield's work from 1911 to the present.

Katherine Mansfield's Selected Stories-Katherine Mansfield 2006 With the exception of the first four stories, all were written within a period of ten years. These stories, and the letters following, reflect the urgency of a writer who knew her time was limited. All but four of the texts of the stories reprinted here are versions that Mansfield herself revised or selected. Twenty excerpts from Mansfield's correspondence address the craft of writing and her own views on her work, subjects rarely broached in her many letters. "Criticism" includes eighteen essays that collectively suggest the changing emphases in how Mansfield has been read by critics. Contributors include fellow writers Rebecca West, T. S. Eliot, Katherine Anne Porter, V. S. Pritchett, Elizabeth Bowen, and Frank O' Connor, as well as biographers Claire Tomalin and Vincent O'Sullivan, among others. Modernism, Magazines, and the British avant-garde-Faith Binckes 2010-05-20 This book is a re-examination of the fertile years of early modernism immediately preceding the First World War. During this period, how, where, and under whose terms the avant-garde in Britain would be constructed and consumed were very much to play for. It is the first study to look in detail at two little magazines marginalised from many accounts of this competitive process: *Rhythm* and the *Blue Review*. By thoroughly examining not only the content but the interrelated networks that defined and surrounded these publications, Faith Binckes aims to provide a fresh and challenging perspective to the on-going reappraisal of modernism. Founded in 1911, and edited by John Middleton Murry with assistance from Michael Sadleir and subsequently from Katherine Mansfield, *Rhythm* and *The Blue Review* featured a series of pivotal moments. *Rhythm* was the arena for a challenge to Roger Fry's vision of Post-Impressionism, for the introduction of Picasso to a British audience, for early short stories and reviews by Lawrence, and for Mansfield's discovery of a voice in which to frame her breakthrough writing on New Zealand. A further context for many of these experiments was the extended and acrimonious debate *Rhythm* conducted with A.R. Orage's *New Age*, in which issues of the proper gender, generation, and formulation of modernity were debated month by month. However, reading magazines as vehicles for avant-garde development can only provide half the story. The book also pays close attention to their dialogic, reproductive, and periodical nature, and explores the strategies at work within the terminology of the new. Crucially, it argues that they offer compelling material evidence for the consistently mobile and multiple boundaries of the modern, and puts forward a compelling case for focusing upon the specificity of magazines as a medium for literary and artistic innovation.

Writing Machines-N. Katherine Hayles 2002 Tracing a journey from the 1950s through the 1990s, N. Katherine Hayles uses the autobiographical persona of Kaye to explore how literature has transformed itself from inscriptions rendered as the flat durable marks of print to the dynamic images of CRT screens, from verbal text to the diverse sensory modalities of multimedia works, from books to technotexts. Hayles concludes by speculating on how technotexts affect the development of contemporary subjectivity. *Writing Machines* is the second volume in the *Media Work Pamphlets* series.

Look Back Harder-Allen Curnow 2013-10-01 The collected critical writings of one of New Zealand's major poets and critics, covering half a century of his work. She records her findings and observations in a lively, graceful and approachable style that will entice readers to delve further and more meaningfully into Woolf's work
