The Development of the Sonnet in William Wordsworth-Ali Shelil 2014-08-06  
This study deals with the development of the sonnet in William Wordsworth. It explains, first of all, the reasons for Wordsworth's return and continuity to write in the sonnet form. Second, it explains how far Wordsworth's sonnets indicate a change in his outlook on life and in his poetic/critical theory. Moreover, it explains how far this change accords with his development in the direction of traditionalism and conservatism and reveals the existence of a conservative streak which continued to grow in him over the years. Consisting of an introduction, four chapters and a conclusion, this study deals with four collections of sonnets written and published by Wordsworth during the period from 1802 to 1822 and traces in these sonnets the development in both Wordsworth's outlook on life and his poetic/critical theory. Thus, the first chapter deals with Wordsworth's early sonnets, which were composed between 1802 and 1807; the second chapter deals with Wordsworth's sonnets which were composed between 1808 and 1815; the third chapter is devoted to "The River Duddon" sonnets (1820), and the fourth chapter deals with Wordsworth's "Ecclesiastical Sonnets" (1822).

However, the sonnet has undergone a very dynamic development, which I will try to at least partly describe in this paper. A sonnet, "per definitionem" consists out of "only" 14 hendecasyllabic lines of verse, which break into octet and sestet, yet it is still considered a major lyric genre used by authors to this

very day. The term "sonnet" or "sonetto" originally meant (in "Provençal") "short lyric poem" (or "light poem"). However, due to the massive amount of sonnet-production in Italy and the achievements of writers like Petrarch, the meaning narrowed down to what we today regard as a sonnet. In 1575 A.D., the English poet George Gascoigne gave a first, but still rather blurry definition of what he conceived to be a sonnet: [...] Then have you Sonets: some thinke that all Poemes (being short) may be called Sonets [...] but I can beste allow to call those Sonets whiche are of fourtene lynes, every lyne conteyning tenne syllables. The first twelve do rhyme in staves of foure lines by cross meetre, and the last two ryming together do conclude the whole.

The Self and the Sonnet-Rajan Barrett 2010-09-13 The Self and the Sonnet is an interdisciplinary study which considers the sonnet, a near eight hundred year old form, and looks at the historical meanderings and the popularity of the form among cultures that are far removed from the location of its origin in Italy. The book tracks the notion of the self from its Platonic beginnings to the Postmodern, using insights from Charles Taylor, Brian Morris and Calvin O. Schrag so as to work out a model of the self. Jan Patočka's phenomenological notions of the self and Chaos Theory are important cohesive elements in the composition of this model. A limit point in Mathematics is a point that is not in the set around which all the points cluster. The book looks at the self from the limit points of the body, mind, world and language. It analyzes sonnets which predominantly show a tendency to one of these limit points. However, it keeps in mind the other limit points as possibilities of a comprehensive analysis. The motivation for this body of research comes primarily from the notion of the sonnet being a form that initially exists along with the epic as canonical writers of literary epics also write sonnets. The historic and narrative moment of self in sonnet form calls for a questioning of both the self and the sonnet. The book tries to address the questions: 'What changes in the notion of self prompt

the origin and persistence of the sonnet across cultures?' and 'Why and how is this form compatible with a self that is postmodern and global?' The Anglo-American sonnet, for the most, is addressed but cultures and their attendant forms are also addressed when considering the sonnet. The Arabic zajal, the Persian ghazal, the Chinese sonnet and the Korean Sijo-sonnet are forms that are touched upon along with the Indian postcolonial versions like the forms of the sonnet in Modern Indian Languages such as Bangla, Gujarati and Marathi.
